CHURCH COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS FROM APRIL 2022

1. **Worship and Music** – Organ tuners were here and worked on the organ. Thank you to Bruce for a great job with the paraments and the flowers and thank you to Sharon Erdman for her help. Thank you to Karen Romberger for her job with all of the communions.

2.**Parish Education**- Egg hunt went well. Bible school will be June 13-17, 2022, at the Gratz Park.

3.Stewardship and Evangelism - We will be hosting a Youth Volleyball Tournament during the summer in the Borough Park. Mike Hartman applied for a grant for Youth Day, requesting \$1,500.00, and has not received a response to date. We are working with the Historical Society to develop a historical display and hoping to have an open house/picnic combining the two organizations and opening the Society display up to the community. Simon Gratz will be presenting the original pulpit Bible to the congregation when he visits on Pentecost Sunday, June 5, 2022. Martin Luther will be speaking on October 30, 2022 and discussing his part in historical events leading to the Protestant Reformation. On September 18, 2022, we will be hosting a luncheon following the service and requesting assistance as we update our cemetery records. On December 10, 2022, a Christmas Tour of area homes as well as the Gratz Historical Society and the Church will be held. In Autumn we will begin evangelical outreach with the institution of Foyer Groups. Foyer Groups are groups of three or four couples/families that agree to meet independently over the following year, with each family taking a turn to host. These groups strengthen the ties within the church community and offer opportunities to include unchurched friends and neighbors. Our first Bicentennial Minute was distributed on Palm Sunday and the second will be in this week's bulletin. Our Invitation to Tell the Story is generating some replies, but we ask for reminders to be made in the upcoming newsletters. Next dinner meeting at the Schadle's home on Monday, April 25, 2022, at 6:00p.m.

My Reading Rambles

This morning, I read Philippians 2:5-11 "Therefore God also has highly exalted Him and given Him the name which is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of those in heaven, and of those on earth, and those under the earth, and that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the Glory of God the Father." This is the scripture appointed for today in the Christ in Our Home devotional. It got me thinking back to an earlier scripture and devotional I read on the first day of the year that sparked my curiosity and the need to understand more about the name Jesus.

On January 1, 2022, the reading for the day in The Word in Season devotional was Luke 2:15-21. The commentary of the devotion focused more specifically on Luke 2:21a of this reading. Luke 2:21a reads, "His name was called Jesus, the name given by the angel before He was conceived in the womb." The writer wrote, "Jesus was not an unusual name for a Jewish person. Jesus had the same name as Joshua in the Old Testament. The original name for both men, in Hebrew, is actually *Yeshua*, and it means salvation." After reading this, I immediately was thinking, wait a minute, what? How can two people with the same name in Hebrew get translated to English as two altogether different names?

I talked to Pastor Lindsey about it, and of course given his love for linguistics, he knew. I also went researching on the internet as well to get a much better understanding of everything Pastor Lindsey was talking about when he and I conversed about this. One of the most helpful resources I found to understand this was from an old PBS show, The Origin of Everything. One of the episodes of this show is titled, "What was Jesus' Real Name?" From my conversation with Pastor Lindsey, the PBS show, and other info I found on the internet, it makes sense to me now and I understand how this can occur. The original Hebrew name for both the English names Jesus and Joshua is the same, *Yeshua*. However, the Hebrew name *Yeshua* more closely aligns in English to the name Joshua. Here is why.

The Old Testament was written in Hebrew and Aramaic. Even though there were other men in the Bible in the Old Testament with the name *Yeshua*, and also men that were contemporaries of Jesus, their names were written in Hebrew. When translated from Hebrew directly to English, their names stuck more closely with the name Joshua when they were converted to English.

The New Testament was written in Greek. Translators tried to convert the word Yeshua into the ancient Greek language, but because they didn't have any letters in Greek to translate to the "sh" of *Yeshua*, they ended up substituting the "sh" sound in the middle of the name to the letter "s," which ended up being *Iesus* in Greek. It took a while for the "J" sound to be placed in front of the Greek name *Iesus*. It wasn't until 16th century translations of the English Bible that *Iesus* was spelled *Jesus*. Therefore, a man named *Yeshua* in the Old Testament (written in Hebrew) became Joshua in the English translation, and the *Yeshua* of the New Testament (written in Greek) was transliterated to *Jesus* in the English translation.

Now, the distinction between translation and transliteration is key to understanding how this happened. Translation is the act of changing a word from one language to its equivalent in another language. Transliteration is the conversion of letters and sounds from one alphabet to another. Therefore, the name of *Yeshua* in the Old Testament translates to English as Joshua, and the name *Yeshua* in the New Testament transliterates to the English name *Jesus*.

This means that in the case of Joshua, the name went directly from *Yeshua* in Hebrew (the language the Old Testament was written) to Joshua in English. In the case of Jesus, his name traveled a more linguistic journey going from *Yeshua* in Hebrew to *Iesus* in Greek (the language the New Testament was written) to *Jesus* in English.

I also learned why the Bible refers to people by their first name followed by one or two descriptions after the first name. For the Jewish people, a Jewish name was a First Name (in Hebrew) followed by a name that established a parental connection or place of origin. In Hebrew, a person's name would be First Name (in Hebrew) + Ben (meaning son of) or Bat (meaning daughter of) + Father's Name and sometimes Mother's Name +/or Place of Origin to help establish where the person is from and to identify people with the same name but from different places.

However, in the case of Jesus, he is the son of God and Mary. So, the traditional Jewish naming convention of Yeshua/Jesus (First Name) Ben (Son of) Joseph (Mary's Husband) wouldn't be fitting. Instead, during his lifetime, he was known as Jesus of Nazareth drawing the second half of his name from where he was from and not from either parent. The Christ portion of his name used in the Bible is a word which, when translated from Greek, means The Messiah or God's Anointed One. This is where the name Jesus Christ originates.


I don't know about you, but I find all of this very fascinating. Now when I read the Bible and I see similar references for people's names, I'll be thinking about all of this information. How exciting to learn some of the mysteries within the Bible and some fascinating facts too. I'm so glad I finally started reading the Bible on a regular basis and have started learning about these captivating pieces of Bible history and nuances that I wasn't aware existed until I started reading it and devotionals. This has made reading this book so much more exciting and interesting. Now I want to learn more and more of what else might be hiding among the pages and the history contained in them. I'd be glad to hear of something intriguing you read in the Bible, a daily devotional, or something that led you to follow your curiosity and what you learned as a result.

Springtime Coffee Cake 1 pkg. lemon cake mix 1 can peach filling 3 eggs Topping ¹/₂ cup sugar ¹/₂ cup flour

¹/₂ tsp. lemon juice ¹/₂ cup nuts



¹/₄ cup butter ¹/₂ tsp lemon juice

Combine dry cake mix, eggs, pie filling, and lemon juice. Blend on low speed of mixer till well mixed the fold in nuts. Spread in to greases 9x13 inch baking pan. Combine topping ingredients and sprinkle over the top. Bake at 350* for 40-50 minutes. (if desired you may mix together 10x sugar and some milk to make a drizzle and drizzle it over the top when cake is cooled.)

Mandarin Orange Sherbet Salad

large pkg. orange Jello
pint orange sherbet
can mandarin oranges

2 bananas (sliced)1 cup whipped topping2 cups boiling water

Dissolve Jello in 2 cups boiling water. Add sherbet (that has been removed from freezer for 5-10 minutes) and stir until dissolved. Chill until partly set. Add the whipped topping and fruit. Mix thoroughly and pour into 9x13 inch pan and let set in refrigerator.

Quick and Easy Minestrone Soup	
5 ribs of celery (chopped)	1 cup tomato juice
1 cup onion (chopped)	1 tsp salt
2 tbsp. oil	¹ / ₂ tsp pepper
¹ / ₄ tsp. thyme	¹ / ₄ tsp. oregano
¹ / ₄ lb. spaghetti	¹ ⁄4 tsp. paprika
2(no.2) cans kidney beans	¹ / ₄ lb. American cheese

Sauté celery and onion in oil. Cook spaghetti in salted water, do not drain. Add celery, onions, beans, tomato juice, and seasonings and spices. Simmer for about 15 minutes. Grate cheese and add last. Simmer until cheese melts. Serve with your favorite bread.





<u>Nearer, My God, to Thee</u> <u>1840</u>

It was reported that the band aboard the *Titanic* gallantly played "Nearer, My God, to Thee" as the great liner sank to its watery grave on April 14, 1912. A Canadian survivor told of being comforted by its strains. Historians, however, have never been able to nail down the validity of the story.

Never mind. It's a great hymn anyway, written by a woman named Sarah Flower Adam. She was born in Harlow, England, in the winter of 1805. Her father was a newspaper editor and a man of prominence.

Sarah herself grew up enjoying the spotlight. She showed great interest in the stage and dreamed of being an actress. In 1834, she married William Bridges Adams, a civil engineer. The couple lived in London where Sarah could be near the great theaters. In 1837, she played "Lady McBeth" in the Richmond Theater in London to rave reviews.

Her frail health hampered her career, however, she found herself focusing more on her literary gifts. Its said that she wrote quickly, as if under compulsion; and seldom did editors find anything to change in her work. Among her compositions were hymns

of praise to the Lord. Sarah's sister, Eliza, a gifted musician, often wrote the music for her hymns. The two were very close.

One day in 1841, their pastor, Rev. William Johnson Fox of London's South Place Unitarian Church, paid a visit. He was compiling a church hymnbook and wanted to include some of their hymns. He further mentioned that he was frustrated at his inability to find a hymn to go along with the upcoming Sunday's message, which was from the story of Jacob at Bethel in Genesis 28:20-22.

Sarah offered to write a hymn based on those verses. For the rest of the week she poured over the passage, visualizing Jacob's sleeping with a stone for his pillow as he dreamed of a ladder reaching to heaven. The following Sunday, South Place Unitarian Church sang Sarah's "Nearer, My God, to Thee."

Eliza, who was suffering from tuberculosis, died in 1846. Sarah had faithfully cared for her sister during her illness, but by the time Eliza died, Sarah, too was showing signs of consumption.

She passed on August 14 1848, at age 43.
