We Belong Together

One of my favorite episodes from the old Andy Griffith Television show was when the Women's Historical Society discovered that a living descendant of a Revolutionary War hero was living right there in Mayberry. The news generated excitement and curiosity throughout the town as people made plans for recognizing the hero's relative. Barney Fife, of course, twisted his own family tree to the point that he put himself in line for the honor. The rest of the townspeople felt special just because someone among them was related to a hero.

However, everyone was shocked when the person was finally revealed. A careful analysis of the genealogical records determined that the hero's descendent was none other than, Otis Campbell, the town drunk. Despite suggestions to find a "substitute Otis" for the presentation, the real Otis showed up for the ceremony true to form. When the ladies finally give him the plaque, Otis holds it in his hands for a moment, and then decides instead to give the plaque to the town. He tells them, "Just because you're the descendent of a hero doesn't make you one too. So, I would like to present this plaque to the town of Mayberry, to which I am just proud to belong."

Good for Otis. Perhaps his lifestyle needs improvement. Yet to recognize that which makes his life good is not his drinking, or being a descendant of some war hero, but belonging to a community of people who care for their own. Perhaps taken at heart, this event could be the beginning of a new chapter in the life of a town drunk.

Everybody wants to feel like they belong somewhere. Without a loving family and friends, life can be very lonely and meaningless. When we are alone, with whom can we share our joys and sorrows? When we are afraid or plagued with worry, who will be there to comfort us and tell us everything will be alright?

On January 12 this year, we will celebrate the Baptism of our Lord. This might not have been evident at the time, but Jesus' baptism was more than an initiation into ministry. It was the beginning of a new family in which Jesus would be head of the household. With each baptism in the name of Jesus Christ, another member joins. Today, there are about 2.4 billion members of this family.

Yet, our most intimate Christian experience revolves around the church in which we belong. When we baptize a new child of God, we make them kin to each and every member of that congregation. It is by the wisdom of God that the individual congregation has become the center point of the Christian experience. Saint Paul wrote that each congregation is a microcosm of the

body of Christ, and each person is an essential member of that body. By this structure, relationships of love and respect develop between its members. You belong in a complex web of family and friendship.

I am reminded of the imagery of a jig saw puzzle. When you pour the pieces on the floor, all you can see is a pile of mixed colors and shapes without form. But put the puzzle together and you discover a beautiful scene of snowcapped mountains reflected in a bright blue lake surrounded by trees and grass so green it seems like you could reach in pluck a blade.

Sometimes we might feel like we are a part of a zig saw puzzle all mixed up. Yet we know the beauty of a church on the hill named Simeon United Luther Church and inside beautiful people living in the Spirit of the Beloved One, Jesus Christ. A place we can all say we are proud to belong to.



Music Notes & FIFTHER



Another Year Is Dawning 1874

In many churches, the first Sunday of the year wouldn't be complete without singing Frances Ridley Havergal's great "Another Year Is Dawning." Its words reflect the deep consecration that marked her poems. Frances considered every New Year's Day a never-to-be-missed opportunity of rededication to Christ, and several New Year's hymns came from her pen.

This particular poem, "Another Year is Dawning," was written as a prayer for the beginning of 1874. Frances composed it near the end of the old year and had it printed on a specially designed greeting card to send to friends. The caption said, "A Happy New Year! Ever Such It Maybe!"

A it turned out, Frances herself needed that prayer, because just a few days later she suffered a stunning disappointment. She was hoping to be launched as an author in America, and her agent in New York had made reassuring promises. Then came a letter she thought would bear the first of many royalty checks. Instead, it reported that her publisher had gone bankrupt in the Stock Market crash of 1873.

But as Frances had only recently turned all her affairs over to the Lord, she bore the crisis with peace, writing to a friend:

I have just had such a blessing in the shape of what would have been only two months ago a really bitter blow to me...I was expecting a letter from America, enclosing thirty-five pounds now due me, and possibly news that [my book] was going on like steam. The letter has come, and, instead of all this, my publisher has failed in the universal crash. He holds my written promise to publish only with him as the condition of his launching me, so this is not simply a little loss, but an end of all my American prospects....

I really had not expected that He would do for me so much above all I asked, as not merely to help me to acquiesce in this, but positively not to feel it at all, and only to rejoice in it as a clear test of the reality of victorious faith which I do find brightening almost daily. Two months ago this would have been a real trial to me, for I had built a good deal on my American prospects; now "Thy will be done" is not a sigh but only a song.

Chefs Corner

Creamy Beef and Bowtie Pasta

1-12 oz bowtie pasta
1 lb. ground beef
1/2 cup onion finely chopped
2 cloves garlic, minced
1 cup heavy cream
1 cup beef broth
1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese
1 cup frozen peas
1 lb. ground beef
2 cloves garlic, minced
1 cup beef broth
1 cup mozzarella cheese
Salt and pepper, to taste

Cook the bowtie pasta according to package directions until al dente. Drain and set aside. In a large skillet, cook the ground beef over medium heat until browned. Drain any excess fat. Add the chopped onion to the skillet and cook until softened. Add the minced garlic and cook for an additional minute. Pour in the beef broth and bring it to a simmer. Let it reduce slightly.



Stir in the heavy cream and simmer until the sauce thickens. Add the cooked pasta to the skillet and toss to coat. If using, add the frozen peas and cook until heated through. Stir in the grated Parmesan cheese and shredded mozzarella cheese until melted and combined.

Cheese Danish

2 cans of crescent rolls 2 8-ounce packages of cream cheese

1 cup sugar 1 tsp. vanilla 1 egg 1 egg white Glaze: ½ cup powdered sugar 2 Tbsp. milk

½ tsp. vanilla extract

Preheat oven to 350* degrees and grease a 13x9-inch baking pan. Lay a pack of crescent rolls in the pan and pinch the openings together. Beat the cream cheese, sugar, vanilla, and egg together until smooth. Spread the mixture over the crescent rolls evenly and then lay the second pack of crescent rolls on top of the cheese mixture and brush with egg white. Bake for 35-45 minutes until the top is golden brown. Top with glaze after cooling for 20 minutes.

Garlic Ritz Snacks

1 box Ritz crackers ½ cup butter, melted 1 tsp. garlic powder ½ tsp. dried parsley

¹/₄ tsp. salt ¹/₄ cup grated Parmesan cheese

Preheat your oven to 300*. In a small bowl, mix together the melted butter, garlic powder, dried parsley, and salt. Arrange the Ritz crackers on a baking sheet in a single layer. Brush each cracker with the garlic butter mixture, then sprinkle with grated Parmesan cheese. Bake in the preheated oven for about 10 minutes, or until the crackers are golden and crispy. Remove from the oven and let cool on the baking sheet for 5 minutes before serving. These make a perfect snack or appetizer.

Asparagus Stuffed Chicken Breast

4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts 12 asparagus spears, trimmed

1 cup mozzarella cheese, shredded 1 tsp. garlic powder 1 tsp. paprika Salt and pepper to taste

2 Tbsp. olive oil

Preheat your oven to 375*. Lay each chicken breast between two sheets of plastic wrap and gently pound them to an even thickness. Season each chicken breast with garlic powder, paprika, salt, and pepper on both sides. Place 3 asparagus spears and a generous sprinkle of mozzarella cheese on one end of each chicken breast. Roll up the chicken breast, securing the filling inside with toothpicks or kitchen twine. Heat olive oil in an oven-safe skillet over medium-high heat. Sear the stuffed chicken breasts for about 2 minutes on each side until they turn golden brown. Transfer the skillet to the preheated oven and bake for 20-25 minutes or until the chicken is cooked through.
