One Lord, One Faith

Therefore, since we are justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have obtained access to this grace in which we stand; and we boast in our hope of sharing the glory of God. (Romans 5:1,2)

This past week, the Catholic church chose a new pope in Pope Leo XIV, formerly known as Cardinal Robert Prevost. He is the first pope from the United States. Born in Chicago, Illinois, in 1955, he has also spent significant time working in Peru, where he was a missionary and later a bishop.

Pope Leo XIV is a member of the Order of St. Augustine, making him the first Augustinian pope. He has long identified himself as a "son of St. Augustine" and has spoken about his deep connection to the order.

This made me think of another Augustinian monk. His name was Martin Luther. However, much has changed in the world and the Catholic church in the past 500 years since Luther entered the world stage. Martin Luther grew up in a time when most of the population of Europe was illiterate, superstitious, and lived in adjunct poverty. Life was hard and short, and death was a constant companion. For centuries, the Catholic Church had welded absolute power over both kings and peasants. God was portrayed as wrathful and unforgiving. Sin and punishment were obsessed over, and the only escape was a demanding set of religious duties and rituals.

As an Augustinian monk, the young Martin Luther struggled with this concept of such an angry God and was convinced he could never please such a God. Luther fell into great periods of desperation and despair and felt that Satan was his constant torturer. Yet, Luther's superior and spiritual adviser, Johann von Staupitz, saw something else in Luther. Luther had an aptitude for learning and a great passion for knowledge. So Staupitz sent Luther away from the confines of the monastery to Study Theology at the University in Wittenberg, Germany. Martin Luther was on a quest for truth.

When Luther first read the Book of Romans, it was like a dark shroud which had always kept him struggling in the darkness of his own fears, was lifted. The God that the Apostle Paul describe was nothing like the God he had been taught about at all. This was a God of love. This was a God who loved the world so much that he did not even withhold his only Son from suffering and death. This was a God who was not impressed with all the works of righteousness in the purchase of indulgences, collecting of relics, performance of masses, and all the other rituals the church had dictated were necessary to reach heaven.

The answer was really, quite simple. All God desired from us was our faith and trust in him, and Jesus had done the rest. Paul taught that the grace from God cannot be earned but was a free gift. For Luther, an overbearing burden had been lifted from his soul, and his whole world was changed. Thank the Lord that Luther did not keep this discovery to himself. With a passion he could not contain, he went out to tell everyone the truth. The world would never be the same. It would be turned upside down in one of the most dramatic shifts in history.

Since the time of Martin Luther, the relationship between the Catholic and Lutheran church has improved significantly over the years, with ongoing efforts toward unity and dialogue. While historical divisions remain, both churches have made strides in fostering mutual understanding.

One of the most important milestones was the Joint Declaration on the Doctrine of Justification, signed in 1999, which acknowledged a shared belief in salvation by grace through faith. This was a major step in overcoming theological differences that had persisted since the Reformation.

Let us pray for the Catholic church in its new pope, Leo XIV. May the communion of saints of all the Christian faiths work together to share the good news of Jesus Christ, as we proclaim him as the one Lord and Savior for all people.


Disneyland Peanut Butter Squares

14 whole graham cracker sheets 2 cups peanut butter

8 Tbsp. butter, softened 2 tsp. vanilla

1/2 tsp. salt 31/2 cups powdered sugar 4 Tbsp. shortening 4 cups chocolate chips

Spray a 9×13 -inch glass baking dish with non-stick spray. Place 2 whole graham cracker sheets in a bag and crush them into crumbs. Set aside. Mix the peanut butter, butter, vanilla, and salt. Slowly add the powdered sugar, a little at a time. In a microwave-safe bowl, heat chocolate chips with shortening. Heat for



30 seconds at a time, stirring between, until smooth. Be careful not to overcook. Lay the first layer of graham crackers (6 whole sheets) in sprayed baking dish. Pour about ½ of the chocolate into a thin layer over the graham crackers. Using your hands, take fistfuls of the peanut butter mixture and flatten it. Lay it on top of the chocolate layer. Cover as best you can without breaking the graham crackers below. You will use all the peanut butter mixture. Layer another ⅓ of the chocolate on top of the peanut butter and then layer again with graham crackers (6 whole sheets) and pour the remaining chocolate on top. Sprinkle the crushed graham cracker crumbs on top. Let cool in the refrigerator for at least 1 hour. Cut into squares, big or small.

Smoky Cheddar Ranch Chicken & Sausage Pasta

1 lb. chicken breast, diced 1 lb. smoked sausage, sliced

12 oz penne or rotini pasta 4 cups chicken broth

1 cup heavy cream 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese

1 packet ranch seasoning mix 1 cup onion, diced 2 Tbsp. garlic, minced 2 Tbsp. olive oil

Salt and pepper to taste

Heat olive oil in a large pot over medium heat. Add diced chicken and sausage, cook until the chicken is browned. Add onion and garlic, cooking until softened. Stir in chicken broth, heavy cream, ranch seasoning, and uncooked pasta. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat to low. Cover and simmer, stirring occasionally, until pasta is cooked. Remove from heat and stir in shredded cheddar cheese until melted and creamy. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Serve warm, garnished with chopped parsley if desired.

Meatballs in a Rich Mushroom Gravy

1 lb. ground beef

1/2 cup breadcrumbs

1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese
1 egg
1 tsp. garlic powder

1 tsp. onion powder

Salt and pepper to taste

1 Tbsp. olive oil 1 cup beef broth

1 cup sliced mushrooms 1 packet onion soup mix

1 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce

In a large bowl, combine the ground beef, breadcrumbs, Parmesan cheese, parsley, egg, garlic powder, onion powder, salt, and pepper. Mix until well combined and form into meatballs, about 1 inch in diameter. Heat olive oil in a skillet over medium heat. Brown the meatballs on all sides, for about 5-7 minutes. Transfer the meatballs to the slow cooker. In the same skillet, add the sliced mushrooms and sauté for 3-4 minutes until they are tender. Add the beef broth, onion soup mix, and Worcestershire sauce, stirring to combine. Pour the mixture over the meatballs in the slow cooker. Cover and cook on low for 6-8 hours or on high for 3-4 hours, until the meatballs are cooked through and tender. If you prefer a thicker gravy, mix cornstarch with a little water to create a slurry and stir it into the slow cooker during the last 30 minutes of cooking. Serve the meatballs over mashed potatoes or egg noodles, garnished with additional parsley if desired.

Music Notes & FIFTHER



Onward Christian Soldiers 1865

Rev. Sabine Baring-Gould was born in Exter in 1834. His father, an officer with the East India Company, had a disabling carriage accident and decided that if he couldn't work, he could at least travel. As a result, little Sabine was dragged from one end of Europe to the other, year after year. It gave him an unsettled childhood, spotty schooling, and a wanderlust he never outgrew. He later managed to scrape through Cambridge, but for the most part he is remembered as a brilliant, self-taught scholar. That helps explain why he developed certain eccentric habits. When he taught school, for example, he kept a pet bat on his shoulder.

From Sabine's original mind flowed an endless number of books, articles, poems, hymns, and tracts. This particular hymn, "Onward Christian Soldiers," was written on a Whitsunday's evening in the mid-1860s.

Whitsunday is better known as Pentecost Sunday, it got it's "nickname" because it became a popular day for new Christians to be baptized. The baptismal candidates marched to the rivers or fonts wearing robes of white. Thus, it came to be called "White Sunday" or Whitsunday.

It was on this day in 1865, in the little town of Horbury, England, that Sabine stayed up late searching through hymnbooks for a martial-type hymn for children. The next day, Monday, all the village children were marching to the neighboring town for a Sunday School rally. Sabine wanted to give them a "marching

song" for the trip. Searching his hymnals and finding nothing, he began scribbling on a piece of paper, playing with words, dashing off lines until he had written a hymn of his own just for the occasion:

Onward Christian Soldiers, / Marching as to war,/ With the cross of Jesus / Going on before.

"It was written in great haste," he later said, "and I am afraid some of the rhymes are faulty. Certainly, nothing has surprised me more than its popularity."

Perhaps you've noticed that several of our greatest "adult" hymns were originally written or translated for children. See, for example, the stories behind "All Creatures of Our God and King," "I sing the Mighty Power of God," "I heard the Voice of Jesus Say," and "O Little Town of Bethlehem." Add "Onward, Christian Soldiers" to that list, and visualize this eccentric preacher, singing in step, marching alongside the children—perhaps with a pet bat on his shoulder.
