## Pastor's Message

Ever since I was a child, I have always loved the Fall season. The changing colors of leaves, fields ready for the harvest, cooler days, the fall flowers with their bright yellows, oranges, and deep reds, pumpkins, apples, and Halloween. I think it is fortunate that we live in such a temperate climate as Pennsylvania. While we may complain about excessively hot summers and cold winters, having the distinctive change in the four seasons is worth it.

Back in the days of old, the ancient Israelites did not have access to calendars or clocks to keep track of time. Rather they measured time by the cycles of the moon, the changing constellations in the sky, the advent of rainy season, the times of each type of harvest. In a way, time was an internal clock that was part of them.

Genesis 14 reads, "And God said, "Let there be lights in the dome of the sky to separate the day from the night; and let them be for signs and for seasons and for days and years, and let them be lights in the dome of the sky to give light upon the earth." The wise teacher of Ecclesiastes reflects,

"For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: a time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted;"

The people of biblical times like our own ancestors, found order in the changing seasons and sought to live in harmony with this order. Just as importantly, they found order in the life changes which all humans experience from birth to death. They found no need to try and control time and the natural order. They were at peace with the order God had establish from creation.

In our modern society, we think we can overrule the natural order and make it fit our purposes. We turn on the lights so we can work and play 24 hours a day. People go to extreme lengths to hide the natural aging of our bodies even if it means surgery. Death is no longer a natural part of life, but a terrible inconvenience we are determined to cheat. While there have been some changes, modern medicine still considers death a failure and strives to prolong life even at the cost of a painful and limited quality of life.

Are we any better for all these advancements? Has the 60-hour work week really made for better lifestyles or just more tired and stressed-out people? Medical science has brought many blessings to the world. Yet we also find ourselves in bondage to doctors, pills, and procedures which come with their own harm and suffering.



Jesus in his counsel against our predilection to worry says, "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing?" The key word here is life. In our preoccupation with time, schedules, and external things, we have lost the wonder of life itself. Perhaps it is time that we spend more time living and less time making a living.

Observe the beauty of the Fall colors and bountiful harvests. These are the ways God is continuously at work blessing us. And while the winter months to come seem to bring death upon the land, we know this is an illusion. For in the warmth of the sun and the spring rains in the months to come, life always returns. This is God's natural order. We can do nothing to make it happen. So don't let another day pass you by and miss out on this wonder. God made it for us. For in the years ahead, you may only have regrets that so many days and years have passed you by, but you never really lived but a few of them.


### PASTOR APPRICIATION SUNDAY

Sunday October 12th is pastor appreciation Sunday.


Thank You Pastor Greg for all you do for

# Music Notes





### Jesus Loves Even Me About 1870

Philip Bliss was born in a Pennsylvania log cabin where his father led in daily prayer and where music was the primary entertainment. As a result, the lad found himself drawn to both the Lord Jesus and to music at an early age.

When he was ten, Philip sold vegetables door to door. Approaching an elegant home, he heard a sort of music he'd never heard before. Dropping his vegetables, he scaled the fence and slipped unseen into the parlor. A woman was playing something new and strange to Philip—a piano. He was enthralled. When she stopped, he exclaimed, "O lady, please play some more!"

Spinning on her stool, the alarmed woman saw the little urchin standing there. "Get out of here with your big, bare feet!" she cried. Philip beat a fast retreat, but the sounds of that piano stayed with him and deepened his desire to become a musician.

The next year, he left home to work in the lumber camps, earning nine dollars a month as assistant cook. Later he became a log cutter and sawmill worker, but he never lost his burden for music.

In 1859, Philip Married Lucy Young and spent a year working her father's farm. Lucy encouraged his dreams, and her grandmother provided funds for classes at a nearby music school. The next year, armed with a melodeon, Philip mounted his horse, Old Fanny, and began traveling place to place, teaching music and leading singing schools. In 1864, he sold his first song to a

publishing company. Within a remarkably short time, he was one of America's foremost writers of gospel hymns. Among his songs: "Wonderful words of Life," "Almost Persuaded," "Dare to Be a Daniel," "Hallelujah, What a Savior," "The Light of the World is Jesus," and "I Will Sing of My Redeemer."

In 1870, Philip joined the staff of the First Congregational Church in Chicago. One evening, very weary, Philip found inner refreshment while meditating on Romans 5:5 "The love of God has been poured out in our hearts by the Holy Spirit." Picking up a pen and paper, he began writing: "I am so glad that my Father in heaven / tells of His love in the book He has given...."

As he taught that song to his children the next Sunday, perhaps his mind went back to that elegant parlor where he wasn't welcome, and to the strains of music that had defined his life.

## Chefs Corner

#### **Double Crunch Honey Garlic Chicken Breasts**

4 lg. boneless, skinless chicken breasts

4 tsp salt

2 tsp paprika

2 tsp onion powder

4 tbsp water

Honey Garlic Sauce:

2 tbsp olive oil

1 cup honey

1 tsp black pepper

2 cups flour

4 tsp black pepper

2 tsp garlic powder

2 eggs

Oil for frying

4 garlic cloves, minced

½ cup soy sauce



Slice each chicken breast in half lengthwise to make 8 thinner cutlets. Pound lightly to even thickness In a bowl, mix the flour with salt, pepper, paprika, garlic powder, onion powder, and cayenne. In another bowl, whisk eggs with water. Dip chicken pieces first into the seasoned flour, then into the egg wash, then back into the flour mixture again. Place coated chicken on a tray and let rest for 5 minutes before frying. Heat oil in a deep skillet or fryer to 350\*. Fry chicken pieces in batches for 6–8 minutes, turning once, until golden brown and cooked through. Drain on paper towels. Make the Honey Garlic Sauce: In a saucepan, heat olive oil over medium heat. Add garlic and sauté until fragrant (about 1 minute). Add honey, soy sauce, and black pepper. Stir and simmer for 2-3 minutes until slightly thickened. Drizzle the hot honey garlic sauce generously over the crispy chicken breasts. Garnish with chopped chives or green onions if desired.

### German Potato Pancakes

6 potatoes, shredded 2 large eggs 2 Tbsp flour ½ teaspoon salt

½ teaspoon black pepper
 ½ cup onion, finely chopped
 ½ teaspoon baking powder
 ½ cup vegetable oil, for frying

Peel and shred the potatoes using a box grater or food processor. Transfer the shredded potatoes to a clean kitchen towel and squeeze out as much moisture as possible. Place the drained potatoes in a large bowl. Add the eggs, flour, salt, pepper, chopped onion, and baking powder. Mix everything together until well combined. In a large skillet, heat the vegetable oil over medium-high heat. The oil is ready when a small amount of the mixture sizzles upon contact. Scoop about ½ cup of the potato mixture and form it into a patty. Carefully place the patty in the hot oil and gently flatten it with a spatula. Fry each side for 3-4 minutes, or until golden brown and crispy. Transfer cooked pancakes to a paper towel-lined plate to drain excess oil. Serve Immediately

Serve with your choice of applesauce, sour cream, or savory toppings.

### Peanut Butter Cup Dump Cake

1 box chocolate cake mix 1 (3.9 oz) box instant chocolate pudding mix

2 cups milk ½ cup creamy peanut butter

½ cup butter, melted 1 cup mini peanut butter cups, chopped

1 cup milk chocolate chips Whipped cream or vanilla ice cream (for serving)

Preheat your oven to 350\*. Lightly grease a 9x13-inch baking dish and set aside. In a medium bowl, whisk together the chocolate pudding mix and milk until smooth. Set aside to thicken for a few minutes. Pour the chocolate pudding evenly into the prepared baking dish. Sprinkle the dry cake mix evenly over the pudding layer. Drizzle the melted butter and peanut butter over the cake mix. Use knife to gently swirl it into the top layer without fully mixing. Scatter the chopped mini peanut butter cups and chocolate chips over the top, pressing them lightly into the batter. Bake in the preheated oven for 35-40 minutes, or until the edges are set and the center is slightly gooey. Let the cake cool for about 10 minutes before serving warm with whipped cream or a scoop of vanilla ice cream.
